What is the difference between isolation and quarantine?

Isolation and quarantine both mean an individual stays home and away from others to limit the spread of the virus.

- The term “**isolation**” is applied to individuals who are infected with and/or test positive for the virus.
- The term “**quarantine**” is applied to individuals who have been exposed to the virus (close contacts) but who not are infected and/or have not tested positive.

What should I do if I test positive for COVID-19?

What should I do if I learn I am a close contact?

Guidance for Close Contacts

If you are a close contact of someone with COVID-19, what you are required to do is directly based on your vaccination and booster status.

How do I know if I am considered a close contact?

You are considered a close contact if you have been less than 6 feet away from infected person for a cumulative total of 15 minutes or more over a 24-hour period, **even if you have been wearing a mask**. The cumulative total of 15 minutes includes shorter durations of time if the total amount of time is equal to or greater than 15 minutes (for example, *three individual 5-minute exposures for a total of 15 minutes*).

How do I count the number of days since exposure?

The day of exposure is considered Day 0. First day after exposure is considered Day 1.

For example, John is in the office on Monday, October 1, and has a meeting with Jane. Jane tests positive for COVID-19 on Tuesday, October 2. John is vaccinated and has received a booster so is not required to quarantine, but will get tested on Day 5 (October 6), and will wear a mask when around other people, and monitor his symptoms for 10 days (through October 11).

If I am vaccinated and not required to quarantine, should I come to work or stay home?

In accordance the guidance, if a close contact is not required to quarantine, then they can be at the workplace. The close contact must wear a mask in all public locations and when with other people for 10 days.

What are the symptoms of COVID-19 and how soon might they begin after exposure?

Symptoms may appear 2-14 days after exposure to the virus and may include:



- Fever or chills
- Cough
- Shortness of breath or difficulty breathing
- Fatigue
- Muscle or body aches
- Headache
- New loss of taste or smell
- Sore throat
- Congestion or runny nose
- Nausea or vomiting
- Diarrhea

Symptoms may be mild and can feel like a common cold or mild flu. Please do not ignore these symptoms and report to the workplace; rather contact your healthcare provider to be tested and stay home until you receive your test results.

How do I isolate or quarantine?

- Stay at home and use a separate bedroom and bathroom if possible.
- Do your best to stay at least 6 feet away from other people in the house.
- Do not leave your house to go to school, work, or run errands.
- Do not have any visitors to your house during this time.
- Wash your hands frequently with soap and water for at least 20 seconds.
- Do not share eating or drinking utensils with anybody.
- Monitor your health every day.
- If you need to seek routine medical care, call your doctor before you go and tell them you are under COVID-19 quarantine.
- Do not take public transportation, taxis, or ride-shares to get to your appointment.

What is the “Massachusetts COVID-19 Paid Sick Leave Act” and am I eligible?

The law went into effect on June 7, 2021, and has been extended until April 1, 2022. It provides employees with five (5) days of sick leave that can be used for the following qualifying reasons:

- Self-isolation on the advice of a healthcare provider due to COVID-19
- Getting vaccinated, or recovering from injury, disability, or illness related to such vaccination
- Seeking diagnosis, care or medical treatment for COVID-19



- Complying with a quarantine order from a public official, health authority, employer, or a healthcare provider
- Inability to telework due to COVID, because they have been diagnosed with COVID and the symptoms inhibit their ability to telework

The law also allows employees to take this leave to care for family members in the following situations:

- Caring for a family member who: (i) is self-isolating due to a COVID diagnosis; (ii) needs medical diagnosis, care or treatment for COVID symptoms; (iii) or is obtaining a vaccination relating to COVID-19 or is recovering from an injury, disability, illness or condition related to such immunization (part iii is a new qualifying reason to take this leave)
- Caring for a family member due to a quarantine order from a public official, health authority, the family member's employer, or a healthcare provider
 - Employees who need to take leave to care for a child under a quarantine or isolation order from school may utilize this leave
