FACTS 2004-2005

The University of Massachusetts - The University was established in 1863 as the Massachusetts Agricultural College, located at Amherst. It became known as the Massachusetts State College in 1932 and in 1947 became the University of Massachusetts. The Worcester and Boston campuses were established in 1962 and 1964, respectively. The Lowell and Dartmouth campuses (previously the University of Lowell and Southeastern Massachusetts University, respectively) were consolidated into the University under Chapter 142 of the Acts of 1991. The University is governed by a single Board of Trustees composed of 19 voting members and 3 non-voting members. The President of the University (located in Boston) oversees the five-campus system, and each campus has its own Chancellor.

UMass Amherst - The flagship, public Land-Grant Research University of the Commonwealth is one of today's leading centers of public higher education in the Northeast. It offers 6 associate's, 86 bachelor's, 70 master's and 50 doctoral degree programs. UMass Amherst has achieved a growing reputation for excellence in an increasing number of disciplines, for the breadth of its academic offerings, and for the expansion of its historic roles in education, research, and public service.

UMass Boston - The only public university in metropolitan Boston, located on Boston harbor, the Boston campus offers 78 undergraduate degree programs, 51 master's and graduate certificate programs, 13 doctoral programs, and 14 undergraduate certificate programs through its five colleges and Division of Corporate, Continuing, and Distance Education. UMass Boston serves the most diverse student population in New England. As a key institution in Boston that sponsors 28 Research Centers and Institutes, UMass Boston contributes substantially to public policy discussion and formulation in such areas as economic development, social well-being, environmental affairs, and health care. UMass Boston is integral to the City and its neighborhoods, reaching out through partnerships with the Boston Public Schools, local businesses, community programs, and youth sports.

UMass Dartmouth - A vibrant public university actively engaged in personalized teaching and innovative research, and acting as an intellectual catalyst for regional economic, social, and cultural development, UMass Dartmouth has an enrollment of over 8,000 students in over 40 undergraduate and 25 graduate programs (including 4 at the Ph.D. level) offered by the College of Arts and Sciences, the Charlton College of Business, the College of Engineering, the College of Nursing, the College of Visual and Performing Arts and the School for Marine Science and Technology. The main campus, designed by the eminent architect Paul Rudolph, is located on 710 acres in North Dartmouth. Other university sites include the Center for Marine Science and Technology on the waterfront in New Bedford, the Advanced Technology and Manufacturing Center in Fall River, and the Star Store Center for the Arts in New Bedford. At UMass Dartmouth, the scholarly research and creative activities of faculty and graduate students are intertwined with the undergraduate experience.

UMass Lowell - The University's most technologically-oriented campus focuses on an integrated strategy in which the academic disciplines of engineering, management, science, education and health are applied in the pursuit of a thriving industrial economic sector. UMass Lowell's academic programs focus on preparing its graduates for careers relating to emerging generic technologies (development of advanced materials, intelligent materials and photonic materials), selected established industries (including the plastics manufacturing and computer industries), and workplace health and safety. The campus offers 5 associate's, 38 bachelor's, 31 master's and 15 doctoral degree programs.

UMass Worcester - The Worcester campus houses the University's Medical Center, including the Medical School, the Graduate School of Biomedical Sciences and the Graduate School of Nursing. The campus offers 4 master's and 13 doctoral degree programs, provides general and specialized medical care to the citizens of central Massachusetts, and engages in a research program which benefits not only the recipients of clinical services, but contributes to the national effort to understand, prevent and treat disease.

UMassOnline - The University of Massachusetts' online education consortium delivers accredited, online programs from UMass Amherst, Boston, Dartmouth, Lowell and UMass Medical School. Online programs embody the same academic quality and rigor as their classroom counterparts, and are fully accredited (NEASC) and nationally-recognized. Online programs span the broad range of academic disciplines that UMass is known for: education, IT, nursing, public health, management, criminal justice, hospitality and tourism, and the liberal arts. Today, UMassOnline delivers 45 graduate, undergraduate and non-credit degrees and certificates, as well as 800 online courses annually to diverse, geographically dispersed learners.
